Proposal to Scrape Wings Museum Hangar No. 1 for Residential Development

The Wings Museum Board of Directors has proposed that the little used westerly hangar, "Hangar No. 1," be sold and scraped for multi-family residential development. The active museum is in the hangar to the adjacent east.

The proposal was to have gone to a hearing before the Landmark Preservation Commission February 6th but was withdrawn per Council member Marcia Johnson's newsletter, due to community comment. In coordination with her office, the applicant will embark on an outreach program to garner neighborhood input on the proposed scrape and multi-family development plan. Earlier, the Museum solicited proposals from 16 developers to rehabilitate and use the present hangar. They ultimately all withdrew, giving rise to the present proposal.

The Museum is under financial pressure. The past year's income was about \$1.4 million and expenses were \$1.7 million. The Museum has sold the now vacant property to the west of this hangar for the Siena project. The Museum also has plans to create an educational facility at Centennial Airport.


I feel the proposal to scrape the hangar is extremely unfortunate. Once the hangar is gone, the defining environment of historic Lowry Air Force Base suffers a significant blow. An indoor soccer area is suggested as an alternative use but no active proposals have emerged.

In addition to clearance by the Landmark Preservation Commission, the City would be asked to rezone the property for the proposed residential use

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Hilltop Historic District Withdrawn

A proposal to create a 500-home historic district in the Hilltop neighborhood will not go forward. After years of planning, the City Council was set for an initial vote on the Hilltop historic district Monday. But neighborhood opposition proved too much.

City Councilwoman Marcia Johnson said today that those spearheading the district decided to withdraw the application. "The hundreds of comments contributed significantly to their decision," Johnson said in a release. "I'm convinced they came to the right conclusion."

The proposed district had been the latest dispute between those trying to preserve the character of Denver's neighborhoods and homeowners concerned about property rights.

Applicants for the district said Hilltop was the first neighborhood in Denver to develop after the automobiles were prevalent. But some homeowners were concerned that possible restriction on home alterations would hurt housing prices. And the city's planning board unanimously opposed the district.

Hilltop would have been one of the largest of more than 40 historic districts in Denver.

Johnson, the councilwoman for that area, said last week that the plan had been controversial. Calls and e-mails concerning the plan, she said, came into her office at a rate that rivaled snow and ice complaints.

Denver Parks and Recreation Park Ranger Program

In April of 2006, the Denver Parks and Recreation Department implemented a Park Ranger Program. Ten remarkable Park Rangers were hired to join the Mountain Park Ranger already on

board. The Rangers are uniformed, unarmed, and carry radios and cell phones. They are scheduled to provide coverage 7 days per week from dawn to dusk. They patrol by foot, bicycle and vehicle. The Rangers have assigned patrol routes and are dispatched to cover calls and requests as they come in. They keep detailed logs and make reports that provide monthly summary data. In 2006 the seasonal positions were staffed from April through October. The Park Rangers made over 22,000 park visitor contacts (continued on Page 5)

The goals of the Park Ranger are to convey park rules and information to park users, field support with additional "eyes on the parks" especially evenings and weekends, increased enforcement of rules and regulations, as well as professional, courteous and competent service to our park patrons in the urban and mountain park system.

The Rangers receive over 100 hours of training, including Denver Police Academy instruction, Denver Police bicycle training, radio procedures, animal control, first aid/CPR, customer service, community forestry, defensive driving, safety report writing, homeless protocol, natural resources management, permit issues, vending issues, urban water quality and environmental topics, horticulture, wildlife management, and media relations.

The Denver Parks and Recreation Park Ranger Program has made a positive impact in both the urban and the mountain parks. The program continues to develop and has received an expansion budget for 2007 to hire fulltime staff. Future ideas include development of a Junior Ranger Program as well as increased education and enforcement of Parks and Recreation rules. It is anticipated that the program will continue to grow, providing a high level of resource protection and education for years to come. In 2007 the Ranger Program will be headquartered at the Montclair Civic Building (the Molkery). We look forward to working with the community and sharing this beautiful historic building. Aubrey Shockley (Joe) has had his life long dream become a reality: owning a restaurant that is impeccably clean and provides "good customer service" and "good quality food" while introducing the community to "genuine old style barbecue." The best of the best is right in our own back yard. Step out, people, and see for yourself. Joe grew up in West Memphis, Arkansas, just next door to Memphis, Tennessee. He is a barbecue master because he has been surrounded by different recipes for barbecue his whole life. Southern hospitality is also evident the minute you walk in the door. Whether it is the friendly greeting from Amy or Cocoa, or just the Motown music; you know that you are welcome and that something good is about to happen.

Joe's hot and mild barbecue sauces are homemade from an old style recipe consisting of 13 different ingredients. The hot sauce is just hot enough but does not overpower the flavor of the meat, and that is a sign of a barbecue master! The dry rub on the lean slab of ribs is another sign of the master. Perfectly cooked. I ate everything but the bone! Partner these ribs with cole slaw, southern fried chips (served hot from the kitchen!), and Texas toast. What a combination! Straight platters and combo platters are available. Joe also offers a super-sized sampler platter, which is just huge. Great for those strict carnivores like me. Beer and wine, sodas, water and teas are available.

Joe's has it all. Main courses include: ribs, rib tips, brisket by weight, catfish, shredded pork by weight, chicken (whole and half) and hot links. Side orders include baked beans, green beans, cole slaw, potato salad, collard greens, French fries, southern fried chips, sweet potato fries, corn nuggets and Texas toast! Whether for lunch or dinner, Joe's is fast becoming a Colfax institution of southern hospitality and honest cooking.

Keep an eye out here! There are several new restaurant reviews coming in the next issue of the newsletter. Joe's was so good I had to return with my family (which has grown recently) and baptize the young'uns. Thank you Aubrey (Joe). A new tradition has been established.



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
