### The Birth of the Montclair Improvement Society by Bill Hansen


The citizens of Montclair did not want to "... go to the officials of Denver as cringing slaves to ask for a pittance." So declared the first President of the Montclair Improvement Society, Mr. T. J. Anders. Since 1903, Montclair had been subsumed within the vast sprawl of the newly formed City and County of Denver. The City Charter had created a strong Boss Mayor in Robert Speers and had weakened the locally elected City Counsel members. Mayor Speer's "City Beautiful" dream embraced islands of spectacular public monuments interconnected with wondrous green parks and boulevards. Montclairions legitimately feared that, despite substantial tax dollars being sent to the City coffers, local affairs would be neglected and basic City services would not be extended to the newly annexed suburban neighborhoods.

Montclair's streets were still called "trails" that were impassable in the mud of winter snows and spring rains. Gas mains had not yet advanced beyond York Street to replace coal for cooking and heating. Sewers were nonexistent. The locally coveted school district had been dismantled. While Park Hill would soon have a new firehouse with modern fire engines, Montclair would not replace its horse-drawn fire equipment until 1924.

Moreover, there was a local nuisance that had to be addressed. Ms. Luella M. Thomas's asylum for "nervous people" was still being operated out of the old Molkery building despite years of neighborhood protests and court battles that had gone all the way to the Colorado Supreme Court. Now, there was a criminal investigation of a beating murder of one of Ms. Thomas's more unruly cuffed and straight-jacketed patients. The neighborhood had had enough.

In March, 1907, the neighborhood formed the Montclair Improvement Society to meet these growing concerns. T. J. Anders, who had lived in the big house at Colfax and Poplar Street since 1890 (torn down in 2004), and was a former Town Trustee, was elected the first President. Dr. Stephen Parsons, who also ran the local pharmacy in the commercial block that stood at 14th and Oneida Street, was made Secretary and Treasurer. Even the Baroness von Richthofen joined.

## Kittredge Park Playground

This summer, neighborhood children have been enjoying the newly redesigned and installed playground in Kittredge Park at 8th Avenue between Olive and Oneida.

Kittredge Park is built on a block of land that once included a mansion constructed by Denver businessman Charles M. Kittredge in 1891, called Kittredge Castle. It later served as the Clifton Hughes Training School for

Girls; Holland Hall, a home for teenage girls; and the backdrop for several scenes from the motion picture, The Glenn Miller Story. The castle was demolished in 1955 and was acquired by the city for a park in 1977.

According to Denver Parks & Rec, the design concept for the new playground included utilizing the historic footprint of the old Kittredge Castle as playground cornerstones, seating areas that recall the old "porches" of the original castle and sandblasted language in the playground's concrete edging. The neighborhood wanted to have a slide similar to the one in the previous design. The playground also includes accessible walkways leading to the equipment. The asphalt walkways along 8th Avenue are slated to be replaced with concrete.



Some of you know that the old spiral slide was a prized play element for many neighborhood children and parents. The parks department saved the slide with the idea that someone in the neighborhood would like to have it but no one ever came forward and eventually the slide was hauled off by the contractor.

The playground was designed by Mundus Bishop Design Inc. and Hydrosystems-KDI, and funded by the City and County of Denver's capital improvement budget.

An ingenious compromise was engineered with the City. Ms. Thomas could not be evicted but the neighborhood convinced the City to condemn the property and add it to Montclair Park as a community center. Condemnation proceedings began in July, 1908 and the Molkery's patients were finally removed. By April, 1910, the old Molkery was completely renovated and reopened as the "Montclair Civic Building" and the City turned its operation over to the Society. The Montclair Improvement Society was soon renamed the Montclair Improvement Association.

The Association has now celebrated its centennial as one of the oldest neighborhood organizations in the City. History does not record the number of pants legs Mr. Anders and his successors have worn out in groveling before City officials and protecting Montclair's interests.
