Get Out and Try Something New-Hangar 2 in Lowry

Most of you may know about the Lowry Restaurant District known as Hangar 2 that is now sporting three new dining experiences—**Café Mercato**, **North County** and **Bubu**. I tried to get to all three for this review and missed Bubu because it wasn't open for lunch. What I hear is that they are serving up fresh locally sourced Asian bowls where you pick your ingredients. I also hear that they are hoping to open up for lunch in the near future. The other two are different from Bubu and from each other giving diners great choices.


Dinner at **North County** was first where we found a full, lively house on a Tuesday night. We ended up eating at the bar to get away from the breezy table by the door and were nicely accommodated. North County refers to the area north of San Diego, embracing fresh ingredients—locally sourced except for the fish-seafood flown in daily. I think a menu's headings



say much about the offerings—Ceviche & Seafood; Other Beginnings: Soups & Salads; Breakfast All Day; Baja Fish Tacos; Tacos; Po Boy's, Hamburgers & Tortas; Happy Hour with Drink and Food Specials; Endings. You can see the emphasis on fish (daily salt and fresh water offerings are posted on the chalk board) and with coastal Mexican spicing and preparation. We started out with the Chips (terrific and fresh), Salsa and Guacamole-tasty and spicy, though I like a less complicated guacamole. Tacos are offered as singles so you can mix and match to suit many tastes. We tried four different ones a nice sampling. All were great with a price range from \$3.50 to \$4 each and offered a mixture of fresh flavors that included the papaya and mango salsa on the Baja Fish or the Mole Braised Short Rib taco. We finished with a non-gluten chocolate brownie with cinnamon ice cream that didn't meet expectations. Gluten free doesn't need to be dry, but this was making me note for the next time to try the 6-layer chocolate cinnamon cake.

Later that week I was able to suggest **Café Mercato** for an early business lunch. For those who might have tried Café Mercato when it first opened and gave it mixed reviews I would suggest giving it another look. We were very impressed with the menu and our choices. The service delivered by Leonardo (pronounced with an accent) was excellent in a bright casual modern Italian atmosphere. Chef Giancarlo Macchiarella (also of Locanda del Borgo in Hilltop) is serving up a light version of Southern Italian cooking. Since I married into a Sicilian family this is my personal favorite of the Italian regional cuisines and the one about which I can be most critical. Two of us each had a salad- the beet with heirloom tomato and the roasted pear-gorgonzola with an addition of a side of shrimp and salmon. These were excellent and the sides prepared perfectly. Though Eggplant Parmigiana doesn't sound light this was, the sauce was fresh and delicious, as were the Crispy Brussel Sprouts with honey roasted walnuts, age balsamic. The serving proportions were just right and the pricing was excellent. The rest of the menu includes pastas, fish, meat and pizza—all of which I hope to try soon. They are about to change out their dinner menu for spring.

Your neighborhood leadership has been vigilant about design concerns for any large scale remodeling of projects in Historic Montclair, and I'm grateful to work with you on these projects. It is important to preserve our Denver History and Montclair is one of the most historic places we have in Denver.

9th and Colorado

The Developer Continuum has closed on the former University of Colorado Health Sciences Campus and is now the legal owner of the property! The closing paved the way for abatement and demolition work began on March 9. Continuum expects to begin building around the end of summer. Phase one of vertical construction will begin at the northwest corner of the property around the existing parking garage. I've asked if any buildings are going to be imploded, because that would be a spectacle and a reason for a watching party,

but they aren't going tp be doing that. Just ordinary demolition.

Continuum continues to engage the community with various meetings. They held a community meeting asking for suggested names for the site. We've been calling it 9th and Colorado so long, and it's time to give it a better place name that represents the vision.

They also held a "Kids Day" asking our youngsters how they would build the site with, get this, Rice Krispies squares to use for building their vision. It was loads of fun.

Quebec St

There is a plan proposed for Quebec St from 6th to 26th Avenue. After a series of community meetings, the city has submitted for federal funding for improvements that involve two driving lanes both ways, improved and completed sidewalks on both sides of Quebec, better left-turn lanes, and easier right turn lanes along with signal improvements.

It also recommends a bike lane on the companion Syracuse Street that would connect to the Westerly Creek Trail/Sand Creek Trail through Stapleton and beyond. See the proposal at www.quebecalternatives.com. No word yet on whether we will receive the funding for the \$20 million plus proposal.

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Montclair School of Academics & Enrichment Update

We are so proud of the work that has been done this year at Montclair! We are blessed with the most dedicated and fun staff imaginable. Looking back on the year so far, we would like to celebrate some of the work we have done to bring new projects and initiatives into the building to help support the wonderful diversity within our community.

Two teams from Montclair competed in the first Design Day hosted by the DPS Imaginarium. Of the twenty teams that participated, Montclair's were two of the top five and were each awarded a \$10,000 grant. With this money, we are developing a project called "The Faces of Montclair", in which we will pilot a one-to-one tablet program in one class-room as well as build out an app that allows for instantaneous communication and translation with our families that speak 22 different languages! In addition to the Imaginarium, a team from Montclair was awarded a grant from Design EDU 2.0, a statewide Design Thinking competition hosted by The Colorado Education Initiative. We were awarded \$750 to revise and reform our school-wide behavior systems to better align with our school values.

We have observed that access to events and the school is a gap in our community and we want to provide equitable opportunities for our families. So we will also be developing "Schoober", an online platform Ride Share program that will create a network for students and families to get rides to and from school from other families. Also, starting in January, Montclair began hosting Equity, Bias, and Inclusion training for our families and community members. As the first school in the district to begin hosting these conversations for our parents, families, and community members, we are excited to see how this transforms our school community.

SCHOOL GARDEN UPDATE

Exciting things are happening in Montclair's "backyard"! Phase 1 – to be completed this spring – includes converting the current vegetable garden area into an outdoor classroom. It will include a seating area for up to 35 students, land-scaped areas, and a raised (ADA accessible) bed for vegetables and annuals. So where will the vegetable garden go, you might ask? During Phase 2 (later this year) we will renovate the north side of our athletic field (just south of the staff parking area) to create raised vegetable beds for each grade level. We also have established a large area for the "Three Sisters" (corn, beans, and pumpkins/squash) in the Northwest corner of the field.

Working with parent volunteers, staff, SlowFood Denver, and neighborhood experts (Thanks Tim and Lisa!) we will tie the Garden renovations into Enrichment programs for our students. Students will plant seedlings this spring to incorporate into the new garden spaces, and will have an outdoor space to work on all areas of their curriculum.

Funding is in place for Phase 1 thanks to the Denver Public Schools Foundation and Colorado Parks and Wildlife's SOLE program. However, we are still seeking funding and support for Phase 2. If you are interested in donating – or volunteering to help – please contact shawnaolsen@yahoo.com.

As 2016 marks the tenth year of the program, Denver voters were asked to support measure 2A this past November to renew and expand the Denver Preschool Program. With success in the polls, the renewed and expanded Denver Preschool Program will now support not only during the school year, but through the summer months as well! As a provider of enriching summer camps in June and July, Paddington Station Preschool was thrilled to learn this news.

HMCAI investigated how the remainder of Montclair could become eligible for the city's **composting program**. We unfortunately learned that decisions as to which neighborhoods could participate in 2015 had already been made, and Montclair is not on the list. We will continue to gather information and make the case for our neighborhood for 2016. We'll keep you informed of progress.

Our District 2 Denver Police Department is co-hosting the next **Citizen's Police Academy** in April. The website states that the Academy is "designed to familiarize Denver citizens with the policies and procedures of the Denver Police Department and provide a unique opportunity to learn about our officers". Neighborhood history lesson! Montclair's first public schoolhouse was built in 1887, a simple frame building on Geneva Street, which is now Oneida Street. In 1891 the school was moved to 13th & Quebec (now Paddington Station Preschool). The original school building was torn down in 1936 in order to build the fire station.

A Landmark Preservation Commission meeting to discuss architectural elements of two new homes proposed on the grounds of the Wilfley Mansion at 770 Olive St. will take place on Tuesday, April 7 at 1:00 p.m. in the Wellington Webb Building, 201 W. Colfax Ave., room 4.F.6. The meeting is open to the public and public comment is permitted. The proposals were approved for mass and scale, and await approval for design. Both homes will be roughly 3300 sq. ft. with two-car garages. To view the designs contact historicmontclair@gmail.com.

Growing up in Montclair Snowy Days, Montclair School in the 1950's

In the 1950's Montclair School was a neighborhood school. Most days the majority of the students walked to and from school even if it was cold and snowing. It was a special treat to get a ride to school. From the south end of Montclair we walked in a growing pack as we got closer to School. My brother and I would start out first from our house at 6th and Oneida and head down Newport Street picking up our friends along the way. Often kids who lived on Oneida would come down to Newport and join us for our walk to school. Several of the older boys had received watches for Christmas. They immediately started us on a strict timing schedule, making sure we arrived on time. The rest of us generally ignored their schedule until they finally gave it up.

When it was cold we had to dress in our warmest clothes. The coats of that time were very heavy and bulky as were the hats, scarfs and mittens or gloves. I sometimes think we looked like we had all turned into weird colored snowmen. The girls had the choice of putting on a pair pants under our skirts or being very cold. Wearing just pants was not an option because girls and women seldom wore pants in the 1950's. When we arrived at school we had to go to the girl's lavatory to take off our pants. Most of us wore snow boots that went on over our shoes. The snow boots were easier to get on than they were to take off. After a lot of fights with my snow boots, I discovered that if I took my snow boot and my shoes off at the same time, I could get my shoes out of my boots more easily. Once we arrived at school we had to put all our belonging on the recessed coat racks in the halls and hurry off to class.

The walk home was a lot more of fun. We didn't have the time restraints that we had in the morning. After the color guard had taken down the flag, we gathered around the flag pole. When everyone was ready for our homeward trek we set off down Newport Street. Since the group had kids from grades one through six, there was much news to share. Sometimes we walked home exploring a different route. Sometimes we even stopped for a snowball fight.

What fun we had.

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Spring Gardening

Spring is here. Recent snows have added welcome moisture to the soil and plants are already popping out of the ground. I have already planted lettuce. Many other cold hardy seeds may be planted now. If you like arugula, it is particularly hardy and can be planted at any time. It is also a good time to transplant plants before the buds break and leaves appear. Compost can be carefully dug into the soil around established plants and spread 3-4" deep in annual planting areas where it should be thoroughly combined into the original soil to a depth of 8" or more. I always recommend leaving any leaves you may have around your plants until the weather has become consistently warmer, although I know many people are eager to clean them up. Leaves (and other organic mulch) moderate the soil temperature and break down, adding to the soil tilth. You can also dig them into the soil rather than removing them. Hopefully you have a compost pile where you put them rather than throwing them into the land fill. As soon as the green sprouts appear on ornamental grasses, cut the old stems down. One technique is to tie the stems together and then cut them all with pruners or saw to within a few inches of the ground. Prune perennials, roses and berries. Check for broken branches and other landscape items that need to be taken care of before the full growing season gets started.

If you are looking for new perennials to add to your garden space and add color to the garden, Plant Select® has introduced new plants for this year (and in years past) that have been tested for the Rocky Mountain Region and usually perform reliably. Most garden centers carry these plants.


A couple of interesting garden tips I found recently are worth repeating here. Most of us throw out the water we use for cooking pasta and vegetables but recent advice advocates cooling this water and using it on our garden plants. The water contains lost vitamins and minerals that plants like. Another tip is to use cooled chamomile tea to water plants. It is apparently anti-fungal and has other good properties that plants like.

I have long advocated and successfully used companion planting and crop rotation in my vegetable garden. You can find charts on these two methods, on line and in books. Use these tips to help plan your garden spaces.




