

Noxious Weeds in Colorado and Denver

Noxious weeds are those non-native plants that are found to be aggressive and invasive. These species propagate easily, will invade and replace native species, reduce agricultural productivity, cause soil erosion and pose an increased threat to communities in danger from wildfire. The Colorado Department of Agriculture (CDA) has a Noxious Weed program aimed at controlling noxious weeds. The CDA tries to prevent new introductions of invasive species, eradicate species with isolated or limited numbers, and contain/manage the well-established and wide-spread species. Many front-range communities have been fighting Canada thistle, field bindweed and several other noxious weed species for years. Some plants get started because people think they are pretty, transplant them from others, and encourage them to grow. Most of the others are spread by seed in the wind or by birds and other creatures. Among the pretty ones are tansy, myrtle spurge also known as donkey tail or creeping spurge, Dame's rocket, purple and garden loosestrife, oxeye daisy, baby's breath, butter and eggs and other toadflax species. Most people do not know these are invasive species. There are also a number of what we all think of as actual "weeds." Thistles are in this category including; Bull thistle, Canada Thistle, Musk Thistle, Plumeless Thistle, Scotch Thistle, as well as several varieties of knotweed. There is also a noxious weed—puncturevine aka goatheads—which produce thorny fruits which can hurt and/or cling to sox and dogs, and travel to other places via this method. I believe we have a crop of this plant south of Montclair School. I try not to walk my dog through there where the fruits have produced.

Noxious Weeds are divided into 3 categories. List A species must be eradicated whenever detected in order to protect neighboring communities and the state as a whole. In this category are Cypress and Myrtle spurge, two species of knotweed, parrot feather, Giant reed, and a number of others. Please consult the Colorado Department of Agriculture's (CDA) web site for complete information and identifying pictures. If you have these species in your garden please get rid of them. You can also download the noxious weed identification mobile app for iOS and Android.

List B species are already established and being managed to prevent their spread. This list includes a number of plants from the thistle family, tansy, teasels, toadflax, oxeye daisy, Russian olive, Salt Cedar (Tamarix varieties,) and several others. Once again consult the CDA website. In our neighborhood thistles and bindweed continue to be a problem. Those who have them should make every effort to get rid of them. To this list I would also add Rampion bellflower or Chimney bells (Campanula rapunculoides) referred to by some as the "purple monster." This variety of bellflower while pretty and often found in older gardens, is very difficult to get rid of or even contain as it spreads by underground runners, by seed, and by root pieces left in the ground after digging.

List C species are very widespread throughout Colorado. CDA will support local agencies with education, research and biological control resources should those local agencies choose to require management of these species.

There is also a Watch List which is intended to serve as an advisory and educational tool. It encourages identification and reporting of certain species.

Neighborhood Planning Initiative and Historic Montclair

The Neighborhood Planning Initiative (NPI) is a new commitment by the city to cover 100% of the city with area plans. This will be achieved over a period of approximately 10-14 years. Under Denver's current planning approach of conducting one or two neighborhood plans at a time, this would have taken approximately 78 years to achieve. To manage this the city has grouped together statistical areas for planning purposes. I am thrilled to report that the East section is in the First Phase for the initiative and planning will begin in the next few months. This area covers our Historic Montclair, East Montclair, Bellevue-Hale,

and Mayfair neighborhoods. The last neighborhood plan we had in these RNOs was East Montclair's and that was in 1992! The others have never had an official plan. Each neighborhood will receive its own section in the plan. These sections will feature recommendations customized to each neighborhood, as needed. Happily, our Virginia Vale and Winston Downs neighborhoods are in the second phase of the initiative.

Neighborhood plans do a lot for communities: They engage neighborhood stakeholders in identifying a future vision for the area and then provide strategies and recommendations for achieving that vision. They provide detailed recommendations for land use and future investments to help ensure neighborhoods flourish as envisioned by the plan. They provide a level of analysis, detail, and guidance on issues affecting local areas that citywide plans cannot.

Upper Montclair Basin Storm Water Study

There have been a series of public meetings with City staff and consultants examining high runoff locations in the upper Montclair drainage basin that is the area approximately from the south eastern corner of City Park, along Colfax to about Quebec and south or southeasterly to the Fairmont Cemetery. Little urban development in the basin was ever planned to accommodate storm water detention or storm water drainage capacity. Flooding commonly occurs in local areas including car bumper deep water at 14th and Kearny, 16th and Dahlia vicinity, and the King Soopers and Safeway blocks.

The following are comments from the Vision Implementation Team (VIT) meeting of May 16.

Key areas to be evaluated, largely flood spots, identified at the earlier March public meeting are the following: Hale Parkway, Severn & Jersey, Colfax and 16th Ave corridors, 14th & Krameria, opportunities for green streets, additional green spaces, efforts to increase community education on flood proofing and other personal property strategies.

- 1. Hale Parkway (one of the historic drainage locations): Traffic should be evaluated noting use from development at 9th and Colorado and nearby. Average daily traffic today is 7100 vehicles. The consultant team will coordinate with Public Works on projected travel demand and capacity constraints for Hale.
- 2. City representatives are to speak at RNO meetings regarding flood proofing tips, resources and tutorials. City staff will also attend the June 27 meeting on additional education materials for the community.
- 3. Colfax Corridor: the efforts underway to promote density include transition of motels to other uses presents opportunities for land uses that improve the corridor, increase neighborhood safety and create space for storm water detention capacity; includes looking into the vacant parking lot at Colfax and Kearney. Strategies:
- neighborhood planning initiatives, code enforcement and coordination among City Departments and projects,
- mapping of potential inundation areas and detention opportunities,
- zoning overlays or other regulatory controls in potential inundation areas
- 4. Plugged or partially clogged drains in the upper basin are a major concern and there is a desire from the VIT members for info on flood tips and who to contact when inlets are plugged or non-functional. Inlets at 11th and Leyden were specifically mentioned. Items discussed included City maintenance schedules, citizen reporting, community groups to clean drains, and community education. Residents should call 303-446-3400 to report plugged drains.
- 5. Project team is to tour 16th Ave. to identify potential treatment sites.
- 6. CU-Boulder is working with Park Hill on green infrastructure and a rain garden pilot program.
- 7. Regional detention opportunities may exist near King Soopers/Safeway/City Floral. An outfall plan would inform the City and developers. The King Soopers vicinity has long been an issue.
- 8. It was asked if there is a way to incentivize a reduction in imperviousness. (Probably not.)
- 9. It was asked if there is an acquisition trigger to flag properties when they come up for sale that are identified in the outfall plan (as potential solution sites).
- 10. A notice could be sent to property owners in potential inundation areas to provide information and resources for such owners.
- 11. Concern was expressed about flood insurance rates in the plan's inundation areas. (Note that flood insurance is always available, if in a FEMA flood identified area, the rate is subsidized.)

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Host Families Needed For Up With People Students This Summer

Experience the world without leaving your home! Up with People is bringing a cast to Denver July 25 to August 28. We are a global education, service, and performing arts program that takes young adults ages 17-29 from around the globe on a six-month, multi-continent tour. Tips To Help Prevent Flooding And Keep Your Neighforhood Clean, Too!

- Ensure street gutters and alleys are clear of trash and loose items that could potentially interfere with storm drainage.
- · Avoid placing trash and recyclables in bags or containers directly on drains and inlets.
- Avoid placing your trash or recycling carts, trash bags, trash cans or loose items out early on your collection day, especially on days when rain is in the forecast. City rules prohibit trash or recyclables from being placed out for collection earlier than 7 p.m. on the day prior to collection and requires that emptied containers be removed from the collection location by 7 p.m. the day of collection.
- When heavy rain is forecast, place trash and recycling bins and items at the end of your driveway close to, but not in, the street to keep the gutter flow line clear and to avoid spillage due to heavy water flow.
- Do not rake leaves, grass clippings or yard debris into the street or alley or put them down an inlet.
- Never, ever throw lawn clippings and other yard debris into a gulch or stream. Call Wastewater Management Division (303-446-3400) if you see dumping or debris in a drainage way.

Neighborhood Parks Update

Last year at this time the Montclarion reported that improvements to both Denison Park and Montclair Park's tennis court were to be implemented in 2016 and 2017. Plans called for the southeast corner of Denison Park, former site of the Denver Water pumping station, to be regraded, sodded, and integrated into the park and for the tennis court at Montclair Park to be resurfaced. A year later neither project has begun. Denver Parks and Recreation tells HMCAI that improvements to Denison Park were pushed to 2017, with the removal of the parking lot added to the project, and work on Montclair Park's tennis court most likely will not happen until 2019, as it is not a top priority for the department at this time. HMCAI continues to ask for basic maintenance of the court, and for weeds, trash, fallen branches to be removed.







Community Reminders

- Summer is upon us and that means more folks outside at night. Help keep our nighttime streets safe and well lit. If you see a street light that is out, please report it to Xcel Energy at xcelenergy.com or by calling 800-895-4999.
- All dogs need to be on-leash on walks and at all parks. Denver has eleven off-leash dog parks, the closest located at Greenway Park on Montview Blvd. and Syracuse St. The fine for having an off-leash dog is \$80 for the first offense, \$150 for the second and \$300 for the third. Citations are issued by Denver Police officers or Denver Park Rangers.
- As the weather warms, and doors and windows are opened, noises are heard easier and more frequently. Citizens are encouraged to be respectful and courteous to neighbors. Denver's

 Noise Ordinance stipulates loud noises from lawnmowers, power tools, construction equipment, is permitted between 7:00 am and 9:00 pm. Amplified music, human voices, and crowd noise is permitted between 7:00 am and 10:00 pm. Dogs must be quiet between 10:30 pm and 7:30 am. or when none of the owners of the dogs are home.

 Noise violations may be reported to the DPD non-emergency number, 720-913-2000, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
- Going out of town for summer vacation? Call Denver Police District 2 at (720) 913-1000 to place your house on vacation watch so that officers can keep an eye on your house during your absence
 - Report graffiti, abandoned vehicles, potholes, fallen branches, and trash by calling 311



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From The Archives

Located at 1426 Oneida St., Denver Fire Dept. Station 14 was built in 1937 to replace Montclair's original 1891 town hall/firehouse. Construction was funded by the Works Progress Administration. Architect C.F. Pillsbury designed the station to resemble a Tudor home so that it would blend in with the surrounding neighborhood. The building received Denver Historic Landmark designation in 1996. The station retains its original wooden lockers, terrazzo tile floor, and fire pole (still in use) which connects the dormitory to the bay.
