



Montclair Park Improvements Update

In December 2019 Denver Parks and Recreation held a public meeting at the Molkery in Montclair Park to discuss the planned improvements to the tennis court, horseshoe pits, and picnic area. Surveys were given to attendees with two possible alternatives for park improvements. After DPR analyzed the comments and tallied the votes in the survey, the design pictured, here, was named the winner.

DPR expects the design phase to be completed later this summer, with construction scheduled to begin in August/ September and completed by the end of 2020.

Expected improvements include a completely new tennis court (current court and fence to be demolished and replaced), two ADA parking spaces, ADA access to the picnic area, and a bocce court will replace one of the horseshoe pits.



A Reminder from Denver Recycles

Please remember that plastic bags should NEVER be placed in your recycling cart.

Do NOT bag your recyclables!

Bagged recyclables are NOT recycled. They are thrown directly in the trash because the bags clog the sorting equipment. Plastic bags labeled "recyclable" are not accepted by Denver Recycles. If you collect recyclables in a plastic bag of any kind, empty the contents straight into the recycle cart and remove the plastic bag. Recyclables must be loose in the purple cart.

Plastic bags can be recycled at local grocery stores, including King Soopers, Safeway and Target. Look for the bin at the front of each store.

From the Desk of Chris Hansen, State Senator

Hello Montclarions,

We are almost halfway through the 2020 Legislative Session and things are moving quickly. Since joining the State Senate in January, my colleagues and I have taken on many important legislative issues, including ending the death penalty, closing a private prison and animal cruelty. For my personal legislative agenda, I am sponsoring several pro-environmental bills that will increase the affordability of solar energy while eliminating a coal severance tax exemption, increasing the procurement of low-carbon building materials for state infrastructure projects, and putting in place programs to drastically reduce methane emissions in Colorado.

Just this morning, I had three of my bills make it through the Senate on final passage. SB20-065 will require hands free mobile phone use behind the wheel and cut down on distracted driving which is a major cause of traffic deaths, both in Denver and statewide; SB20-150 will establish a renewable natural gas standard that will utilize wasted methane from landfills, waste water treatment facilities, and agricultural operations, so that we can continue to cut methane emissions from all sectors of the economy and reach the climate goals we set last year; and SB20-167 allows EV manufacturers to sell directly to consumers which will decrease costs for consumers, increase the sale of electric vehicles, and significantly reduce harmful emissions state-wide. As we continue to move forward, I will turn my focus to bills that will institute more safeguards around gun storage, create sustainable support for transportation and improve K-12 funding. If you have any other ideas of legislative proposals I should consider, or just want to drop by the office to say hello, please don't hesitate to reach out to me.



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From the Desk of Councilwoman Amanda Sawyer

Spring is on the way and even though March is historically the snowiest month of the year in Denver, it also holds the promise of warmer weather and gardens in bloom.

Camping Ban Enforcement Update

At the end of 2019, you may have heard quite a bit about a court ruling that potentially altered Denver's urban camping ban. We want to let you know a little information about this situation. In December 2019, now-retired Judge Barajas ruled that in one specific instance, Denver's urban camping ban was unconstitutional. The City Attorney's Office halted enforcement of the ban while preparing their appeal of that ruling. Our City Attorney's Office has now appealed that ruling and began enforcing the urban camping ban again in January. Our office has heard from many of you, on both sides of this issue, over the past few months.

I know that there are a lot of concerns about our homeless population and questions about what the City is doing to help provide support. We at the District 5 office share those concerns. The Mayor's Office has put forward a package of almost \$7 million in new funding to provide wraparound supportive services and turn our shelter system into a 24-hour system. This is an exciting advancement, but it isn't enough. We have a lot of work to do to provide better housing alternatives for Denver residents. That said, I truly believe that allowing people to sleep on the streets is not the solution to our housing crisis.

There are a number of City ordinances that apply to everyone using our public spaces and the legality of these laws is not in question. For example, park curfews remain in place and signs and structures cannot impede the public right of way. Please call 3-1-1 or use pocketgov.org to report any concerns in our community. If you need housing assistance, please call the Mile High United Way's helpline via 2-1-1, or access denvergov.org/homelesshelp for a list of homeless shelters and services. If you would like to support our homeless community, consider donating time, household items, clothing or funds. You can find more information on places to donate or provide a donation at denvergov.org/give.

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East Area Plan Update

Since November 2019, city planners have reviewed more than a thousand comments on the updated draft East Area plan recommendations and approaches for building heights and housing options. These comments were gathered online, during the November 2019 workshop, and during two office hours sessions.

Throughout the two-and-a-half-year study, community members have suggested big ideas for the East area, the statistical neighborhoods adjacent to Colfax Avenue from Colorado Boulevard to Quebec Street. The predominant themes have been safety and revitalization of Colfax. Improved walkability and traffic have also been popular topics. On a snowy night at the end of January 2020, the Steering Committee met to hear preliminary feedback and discuss potential updates to plan recommendations, including those for housing options and areas of increased height. The strong focus is on equity, inclusivity, and complete neighborhoods.

City planners are considering the feedback from the community and from the Steering Committee and making updates to the plan recommendations. A draft plan will be available for public review in March, and there will be additional community input opportunities in March and April. It is anticipated that the plan will be brought forward for Planning Board and City Council consideration this summer. To learn more and sign up for updates, visit denvergov.org/eastplan.



2020 Spring Gardening

While staring at another of our snowstorms, I am eagerly awaiting Spring's milder weather. Those who are eager can begin preparing for gardening now. Cutting down old perennials and grasses, removing annuals, spreading compost, and pruning can all be accomplished even if the ground is still frozen. Once the ground defrosts, one can plant cold hardy seeds and plants outside even if the temperature is cold. If you have Spring bulbs, they will begin emerging any time. Remember that bulbs need their foliage to mature and bloom again next year. When they have finished blooming cut off the spent flowers but leave the foliage until it turns brown and easily pulls off. Some people like to tie the foliage up with rubber bands to get them out of the way. Indoors one can start tomato and other seeds. Though I sometimes do so, it is really not safe to plant any tender plants outside until after Mother's Day so plan accordingly.

Two things I am constantly rehashing in these articles are: **1. Soil amendment** and **2. Composting**. If you are new to Colorado and haven't yet tried gardening here, you may be in for a shock. First, our soils are commonly heavy clay and need amending to help break up the soil and release the nutrients. Coarse compost or other amendment works better than really fine. Too much soil amendment at one time can bind up the calcium in the soil (of which we have plenty), so amendment should be added gradually and renewed often. For permanent planting beds I specify 4 cubic yards of soil amendment per thousand square feet (compost is good) tilled or dug into the soil to a minimum depth of 6". In annual beds I add amendment every season.

My second passion, composting, is easy to accomplish by making a 4' x 4' pile or you can use a commercial composter. Smaller pieces, layering different materials, turning and watering yield much faster results but it will all heat up and eventually turn into a great addition for your soil. Rather than sending them to the landfill, compost your kitchen waste, leaves and grass clipping. (I do not recommend weed seeds nor invasive plant parts.) If you don't have the room, the time, or the inclination to compost yourself, get a City compost bin. They are available for a modest price per year. The City Compost program takes all kinds of things, not just plant material. Shredded paper, waxed paper, used tissues, paper plates, napkins, cups, pizza boxes and paper towels, all of which cannot be recycled, are compostable.









Baseball in Denver

Even though COVID-19 has delayed Major League Baseball's 2020 Opening Day, it will eventually arrive. The event is unquie among all professional sports, as it typically falls on a weekday afternoon. "Opening Day" doesn't necessarily mean the first day of the season, either. It varies for each city's baseball club. Obviously, not everybody plays at their home field on the first day of the season, and not everybody plays on that first day, either. Thus, each club's "Opening Day" typically falls anywhere in the first 1-10 days of the season. For example, last year, the Colorado Rockies played their first game on March 28 in Miami, but didn't have their "Opening Day" until April 5 in Denver.

Thousands of people are known to play hooky or schedule some time off when "Opening Day" rolls around. It's become tradition for the streets of Denver's LoDo, Ballpark and even RiNo districts to be full of not just baseball fans, but anyone who is fan of a good time and the unofficial arrival of sunny days. Usually.

While I've been fortunate to attend many Rockies Opening Days, one that sticks out in my mind was from their second season in 1994. I had been to a few Rockies games in their inaugural season (I'll always recall the person who once celebrated when a Rockies' player hit a foul ball into the stands, thinking it was a home run). But 1994 was a new year and I had never been to an Opening Day. Unlike 1993, this Opening Day actually fell on the first day of the regular season—on a Monday at 3:30! Furthermore, the Rockies were set to host the Philadelphia Phillies, who had just been to the World Series a few months prior. This felt like a REAL Opening Day. My dad and I were able to score two outfield tickets and we couldn't wait! After all, Opening Day is a nice spring day with sunny weather! Usually.

This was held at the old Mile High Stadium, just over a year before Coors Field even had gates to be opened. The area surrounding the old Stadium wasn't exactly as welcoming or as enjoyable as Blake Street is today. Surrounding the Stadium were parking lots, warehouses and more parking lots. The main lot behind the famous South Stands would sometimes have tailgating, but in short you couldn't stop off for a bite or a drink, before the game. The closest thing you had was the Burger King on Federal Boulevard.

As the game began, the Rockies trotted out their re-tooled line-up. They had returning fan favorites Andres Galarraga and Dante Bichette, while 1993 pitching star Armando Reynoso got the call as the Opening Day starter. They had new arrivals in shortstop Walt Weiss, center fielder Ellis Burks and left fielder Howard Johnson.

The first six innings of the game were relatively "normal"-- even somewhat low-scoring. The Rockies had the lead, 4-2. Then came the seventh inning. It's no secret that the weather in Denver can quickly turn, which is exactly what happened. While we knew there were cloudy skies and a chance of snow, we had hoped the game would be over before the snowfakes arrived. Yet here they were. I remember I was wearing a denim/khaki jacket, but with the sudden miniblizzard, I had to activate my back-up plan-- the long sleeved flannel hoodie (hey, it was 1994 and I was stylin'). So much for that "usual" sunny day.

The snow and wind played havoc with the players, too. Howard Johnson was unable to play a flyball to left and it allowed the Phillies to score a few runs and take the lead. What happened at this point was somewhat historic, as Rockies fans loudly boo'ed Johnson. That was unheard of, as Denver fans had been crazy over their Rockies in 1993 and never boo'ed them! A few more miscues followed and the Rockies ended ther Opening Day losing, 6-12.

Howard Johnson didn't have a good year and was gone at the end of the season. He retired after one more season with the Cubs. Nothing against "HoJo", as by all accounts he was a quality guy and had a decent career, but to me he'll always be known as "the First Rockie to be Loudly Boo'ed by the Home Crowd". You could say that Denver fans grew up a bit that day, as they now had expectations for their team. Fans didn't just cheer them, they now criticized them. In a sense, the Colorado Rockies had officially joined the world of Major League Baseball.

If you're heading over to Opening Day, whenever it arrives this year, have fun. To avoid parking headaches, I'd recommend taking a ride share service or the bus (RTD Routes 6 or 10). Yet be sure to check the weather forecast, as that "usual" sunny day could be impacted. If you need an extra layer, I might still have an old flannel you can borrow.





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
