Micky Boehm and Meg Trubee from Denver Water gave us an overview, as well as details, of the steps in the ongoing lead service line replacement project. Based on current information, Montclair has about 1200 lines that will need replacing and this will happen over a number of years, starting fall 2024. They will get us updated maps when they have them and will write a newsletter column when we get closer to having contractors starting to work in our neighborhood. The General Meeting is also the time when we elect next year's board. As we welcome 3 new board members: Wendy Ho-Schnell, Merritt Pullam, and Ryan Stevens, we want to extend such gratitude to departing board members Valerie Alford, Gretchen Armijo, Caryle Faust, Bill Keesom, and Gail Wallace. We appreciate their energy and effort in making Montclair a wonderful community.



If you live in the designated Historic District (see map to the right) within the Montclair neighborhood and you'd like to build an addition, second story, porch, add solar panels, replace windows, roof, sidewalks, or demolish the house and build new, you must first contact Denver's Landmark Preservation Commission (LPC) and receive approval. Your proposal must meet the design guidelines for historic districts. This is mandatory for residents of all historic districts in the City of Denver. City Council District 5 Updates

As the holidays draw near, we're thrilled to share updates on the exciting developments in Montclair and our beautiful city. Our office would like to extend warm holiday wishes to you and yours! We're eagerly looking forward to the start of 2024 with several projects

in the pipeline. Please stay tuned to our social media and newsletters for the latest in District 5, and read on to discover the most recent happenings in Montclair!

Renovations at Montclair Park

In 2022 the Montclair Park playground was damaged when a storm blew down large tree branches. Due to supply chain issues, Parks & Rec was delayed almost a year in replacing the equipment. The replacement parts have been installed; however, you've probably seen that not all parts have been replaced. This is because the entire playground has been been prioritized for replacement under the Capital Improvements Program funding for 2024. This playground redesign will involve community input. Stay tuned as more information becomes available.

D5 Tiny Home Village

The Mayor has announced that each Council district will house a pallet shelter village as part of his "House1000" effort. We've received numerous emails in our office inquiring about the location of the site in District 5. While I am supportive of the mayor's initiative to provide housing for a thousand people by year-end, District 5 faces the unique challenge of not having any city-owned or city-partner-owned land available within our borders. A private property owner has expressed interest in hosting a site on their private land in District 5. These negotiations are confidential and are exclusively between the private landowner and the Mayor's Office. We will keep you informed once this information becomes public.

New Denver Police District 2 Commander

There have been notable staffing changes within the Denver Police Department. Commander Carlos Aragon, who previously served as Commander Police District 3 (south of 6th Avenue), assumed Command of District 2 (north of 6th Avenue) on October 23rd. We have a fantastic partnership with Commander Aragon and his team, and we are looking forward to continuing to work with them. I encourage all Montclair residents to reach out to the District 2 team and get to know them!

Updates on Colfax Bus Rapid Transit (Colfax BRT)

The East Colfax Avenue Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) project is in the final design and pre-construction phase. Key tasks include refining BRT station and streetscape designs, conducting curbside access management and safety analyses, supporting small businesses in preparation for construction, developing a construction pricing and phasing plan, and achieving Envision sustainability certification. Construction is expected to commence in late 2024.

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


Patriot Update: George Washington High SchoolBy GW Staff

Happy Fall! I hope everyone has been enjoying the cooler temperatures and the beautiful scenery.

Here at the Capitol we are gearing up for Session and during the Interim I have been serving on five committees that

each take on a portfolio of issues to prepare for the 2024 Legislative session:

- The Legislative Oversight Committee Concerning Tax
 Policy is responsible for considering the existing tax
 credits and with the Office of State Auditor reviews tax
 policy effectiveness.
- Legislative Interim Committee on Ozone Air Quality
 works to evaluate where improvements can be made
 in our air quality across the state and how to address
 the Front Range's "severe non-attainment" status.
- Joint Technology Committee works year-round and has oversight responsibility for major state technology projects and the Governor's Office of Information Technology (OIT).
- Pension Review Commission studies and proposes legislation relating to funding of police officers' and firefighters' pensions in this state and benefit designs of such pension plans. The commission also studies and proposes legislation regarding the Public Employees' Retirement Association (PERA).
- Task Force for the Consideration of Facial Recognition Services examines the extent to which state and local government agencies are currently using facial recognition services, and provides recommendations concerning the extent to which state and local government agencies should be permitted to use artificial intelligence and facial recognition technologies.
- The State Board of Equalization The mission of the board is to assure just and equalized property tax assessments and to ensure taxpayers have full access to the appeal system.

I also wanted to share with you that we are hosting my campaign kickoff event for my 2024 Colorado State Senate Re-election campaign at my house (1177 Newport Street) on Sunday November 12th at 4pm. Come for fun, festivities and community! Everyone is welcome and I would love to see you there.

DISTRICT #5 COUNCILWOMAN AMANDA SAWYER

The Councilwoman walked thru the 2022-2023 "Most Important Issues" and requested everyone fill out the survey, available on her website until 31 December 2023.

Denver Police Department (DPD) has created free auto theft prevention program called DENVERTRACK. By registering their vehicles, owners give DPD permission to utilize tracking technologies to thwart would-be thieves and work to recover your vehicle if stolen. Register and learn more at denvergov.org/denvertrack.

There are no properties in District #5 that qualify for a "homeless community". A property must be owned by the city, have a specific zoning, and be located near food services. The aforementioned requirements do not disqualify a private property owner from pursuing the development of a homeless community. If a private

property owner is interested, they will have to negotiate with the mayor's office.

DENVER WATER LEAD PIPE REPLACEMENT, Meg Trubee, Micky Boehm.

Denver Water Lead Pipe Replacement Program includes all houses built before 1951. Denver Water was mandated by the State Water Drinking Program to accomplish the lead pipe replacement. Approximately 64+K houses need to be addressed. 20K houses have been completed, and the goal is to modify 5k houses a year. Pipe replacement takes around 8 hours. Legally this effort needs to be completed by 2035.

About 1200 homes in Montclair have lead pipes, the modification effort will begin in late 2024 for 8th -13th Avenue and Locust – Quebec. Denver Water tries to complete a neighborhood in one effort. However, since some streets have been recently paved in Montclair consequently a three-year moratorium on lead pipe changes has been put into effect. Therefore, Montclair will most likely be done in segments.

Water main pipes in the street are NOT lead, they were replaced in the 1960s.

The homeowner is responsible for the pipes from the street to the house, however, there is NO cost to the customer for this effort. The cost is spread across the entire utility.

The first step is to "pothole" the street to determine if the pipes to the house are lead. If you are wondering if you have lead pipes, Denver water strongly suggests requesting a water quality test at denverwater.org/lead.

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After potholing, a household will receive a package in late spring/early fall, which will contain a consent form. The consent form must be signed by the homeowner before the process can proceed. The construction team (either Denver Water or contractors) will reach out and schedule a walk through. After that your household will be scheduled however your entire block needs to have signed their consent form before the replacement can be scheduled. Someone must be on site for the scheduled time.

After the pipe replacement, Denver Water recommends getting another water quality test. If lead still shows up in the results, Denver Water will come out to determine the source.

Meeting was adjourned by President Baxter at approximately 2040.

Gifts from the Kitchen and Garden

At this time of year, there is often a need for gifts to give. I have always thought it is nice to make something to give others, if possible. The following could use products from your garden or from the store that are easy to make, can be packaged in small containers, and frozen or otherwise stored for later gifts or used now. Feel free to be adventurous, using other herbs or citrus fruits.

Blender Herb Butter

1 pound softened butter, I cup olive oil, 2 cloves peeled garlic, 2 tablespoons fresh thyme, 2 tablespoons fresh marjoram.

Blend all ingredients together in blender or food processor (or finely chop and hand combine). Put in containers refrigerate and use within 2 weeks, or freeze for later.

Green Butter

½ cup softened butter, ½ cup packed fresh herb leaves (such as basil, chives, mint, parsley, cilantro), 1 tablespoon of lemon juice.

Blend together and package. Use or freeze for later.

Citrus Salts

6 lemons or limes, or 4-5 oranges (if possible use organic fruits), Kosher salt

Preheat oven to 200 degrees F. Wash and dry fruit. Using a vegetable peeler, make long strips of the peel, colored part only. Lay strips on cookie sheet. Place in preheated oven for an hour, until the peels are bone dry. Put in blender on high and turn into a fine powder. Mix one part powder with one part salt. Place in sealed containers or plastic bags.





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Baseball in Denver

The Colorado Rockies finished their 30th anniversary by losing 103 games. Ouch. Regardless, over 31 seasons, it's easy to put together an "all-time team" of their best players by position. However, I find those types of articles derivative. Do you really want to read another article about Todd Helton, Larry Walker and Nolan Arenado? There's a lot more to the Rockies than those names. Thus, I thought it would be fun to dig deeper. The guys who never made an All-Star Team, but who were still significant or did something cool. Think of it as the "All-Underrated Team".

I'm taking the 9 fielding positions, a starting pitcher, a middle reliever, and a closer. I'm skipping the Designated Hitter position, as it's only been a part of 3 Rockies seasons... plus, the DH is silly (sorry, AL fans). Here's our lineup:

Starting Pitcher (SP): Jeff Francis (2004-2010, 2012-2013)

Francis was the "ace" on the 2007 World Series team with his 17-9 record. In that year, the Vancouver native became the first Canadian to start a World Series game. In eight seasons and two stints with the Rockies, he won 64 games, placing him 4th all-time on the team's list.

Catcher (C): Yorvit Torrealba (2006-2009, 2013)

Another name from the 2007 team, as well as the 2009 playoff team. Those trips earned him the name "Mr. Rocktober", as he still remains the franchise's all-time postseason RBI leader (12).

First Base (1B): Mark Reynolds (2016-2017, 2019)

The Rockies took a chance when they brought the 10-year veteran in. He was a "feast or famine" guy, as he would blast homers, but also strikeout a lot. His big swing was a good fit for Coors Field and he was even the starting 1B in the Rockies' 2017 Wildcard Playoff Game.

Second Base (2B): Clint Barmes (2003-2010)

The team's Opening Day shortstop in 2005, Barmes was on a Rookie-of-the-Year rampage until a freak accident with deer meat led to a broken collarbone. Some guy named Tulo came along the next year and Barmes was shuffled over to 2B. It took him awhile, but he eventually rebounded and was a key part of the 2009 playoff team.

Shortstop (SS): Neifi Perez (1996-2001)

In the Y2K era, Neifi was often on a lot of reporter's top ten lists. He seemed like an up-and-coming star, even winning a Gold Glove for defensive excellence in 2000. Which made it all the more perplexing when he was traded to the Royals in 2001. He hated being with the Royals, and his

career never recovered. His sad story remains one of the biggest "what ifs" in Rockies history.

Third Base (3B): Garrett Atkins (2003-2009)

Were it not for the fact that the 3B position, across MLB, typically has some big mashers, Atkins probably would've been all All-Star in 2006. A line-drive doubles hitter, he was a great offensive fit for Coors Field. However, his sub-par defense often led manager Clint Hurdle to replace him in the later innings; including the 2007 season.

Left Field (LF): Jay Payton (2002-2003)

Once a heralded prospet with the Mets, Payton's star seemed to have faded by the time he arrived in Denver. He wasn't projected to be a regular, put Payton worked his tail off and became the starter in left field by Opening Day 2003. Even with the beginning of the Coors Field humidor in 2002, Payton still put up impressive numbers and was a significant part of his two Rockies teams.

Center Field (CF): Quinton McCracken (1995-1997)

He came up as a fifth outfielder during the Blake Street Bombers era. However, unlike his OF teammates, McCracken wasn't about power. He was about speed and defense. He quickly became a fan favorite, and many were bummed when he went to the Tampa Bay (Devil) Rays in the 1998 Expansion Draft. It wasn't odd to hear a Rockies fan lament: "man, I wish they could've kept McCracken".

Right Field (RF): Jeromy Burnitz (2004)

It's possible that no player in Rockies history benefited from Coors Field and had a career revival like Burnitz. He hit 37 homers that year, including what was (unofficially) the longest home run I've ever seen to right field.

Middle Reliever (RP): Boone Logan (2014-2016)

Logan had a great 2016 for the Rockies, but his previous two years were rather "ho-hum". So why am I including him? He's the only Rockie whom I've hung out and barbequed on my back porch with (humble brag). He's also the only baseball player to visit my autograph baseball wall and ask to be added to it. He was.

Closing Pitcher (CP): Huston Street (2009-2011)

The 2005 Rookie of the Year with the Oakland A's, Street may not exactly be considered "underrated'. Yet he's not a guy you think of as a Rockies closer. Make no mistake: he was rock-solid during his 3 seasons and was a huge part of the 2009 playoff team.


