

Your proposal must meet the design guidelines for historic districts. This is mandatory for residents of all historic districts in the City of Denver. 

#### **DO-8 Overlay and Hale ADUs**

Exciting developments are underway with the implementation of the Active Centers and Corridors Use Overlay (DO-8) along East Colfax. This initiative aims to activate ground-floor uses, enhance pedestrian-friendliness, and integrate future development seamlessly into our neighborhoods. The Overlay unanimously passed through City Council on December 18, 2023, and is now law.

Similarly, our efforts extend to the Hale neighborhood, where a survey was conducted on rezoning to allow for easier Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs). The survey received overwhelming support, with 58% of respondents in favor. The rezoning process is progressing well, and we are thrilled to announce that on January 17, the Planning Board unanimously approved the rezoning. Stay tuned for updates through our newsletter and social media channels.



# Elections November 4, 2024: Two Denver Ballot Titles Plus a Possible Statewide Ballot

The below expresses **my opinions**, I oppose all of these, readers may differ.

- 1) "Shall the voters of the City and County of Denver adopt an ordinance concerning a prohibition of fur products, . . . . . , prohibiting the manufacture, distribution, display, sale, or trade of certain animal fur products in the City; and providing limited exceptions to the prohibition?"
- 2) "Shall the voters of the City and County of Denver adopt an ordinance prohibiting slaughterhouses, and in connection . . . , prohibiting the construction, maintenance, or use of slaughterhouses within the City, and requiring the City to prioritize residents whose employment is affected by the ordinance in workforce training or employment assistance programs."

Denver voters will act on these issues proposed by radical animal rights interests who want us to transition to a plant-based food system. Boulder voters banned fur sales several years ago and the proponents want the same here in Denver. Denver's Superior Farms is a major lamb slaughterhouse facility located near the National Western Stock Show grounds, employee owned and operated, 170 employees, 70 years of operation.

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The slaughterhouse ban would use public funds to retrain workers for other pursuits. There may be small Denver slaughterhouses that process animals for halal, orthodox, and ethnic specialty menus. Denver has about a dozen fur vendors. Cowboy hats made from beaver fur could be banned, also, people who fly fish may lose access to fly hooks made with animal fur and to fur fly tying materials.

In addition, a possible statewide initiative, #91 (ballot number would differ) may appear if the proponents find the needed 128,000 signatures, would prohibit so called "trophy hunting" of mountain lions, bobcats, and lynx. The proponents claim hunter motivation is to seek "trophies", hide, skull, teeth, etc. Not true. State law requires that edible parts of harvested game animals be prepared as human food. Lion hunting has a winter season and, in snow conditions, tracks from a female and her babies are readily visible and they are not to be taken. Also, lactating females that find refuge in a tree are to be left alone. The Colorado Parks Wildlife staff provide excellent management of mountain lions and bobcats to ensure a healthy population balance and co-existence with food sources. Prospective lion hunters must take a class to qualify and during the hunting season must call in to determine if the allowed kill has been reached for their hunting unit. Lynx are protected and not hunted.

The proponents are out-of-state interests using out-ofstate funding and they want to impose this anti-hunting stricture on our state. They appear not to care about impacts of this measure on our wildlife and on ranch and farm livestock and pets. A mountain lion will kill and consume a prey animal, deer, elk, moose, domestic cow, etc. every one or two weeks. The CPW estimates there are 3,800 to 4,400 mountain lions here. On average, hunters legally kill 500+/- lions a year. Doing the math, if the initiative passes those 500 lions continue in the ecosystem and they will kill around 13,000 prey animals per year the first year and continue the same plus more in following years leading to devastating impacts on our deer, elk, and moose herds and on ranch and farm livestock and pets. Attacks on humans are rare but do happen. Problem cats would be killed by state hunters but at taxpayer expense. 


# The Fax Partnership Update

# From the Desk of Chris Hansen, State Senator

District 31



Dear Fellow Montclarions,

I hope everyone is having a wonderful start to 2024. We are back at the Capitol for the 2024 Legislative session and the pace has quickened. This session I am proud to serve on the Finance, Appropriations,

Joint Technology, Legislative Council, Committee on Legal Services, and State, Veterans, and Military Affairs Committees. Additionally, I serve as the Chair of the newly created Colorado Property Tax Commission. Here is a preview of some of the bills I will be running this session:

- The Seal of Climate Literacy authorizes a school district to grant a high school diploma endorsement in climate literacy to graduating students who demonstrate mastery in climate literacy and attain conservation and technical skills.
- Social Media Required Disclosures, Reports, and Protections for Minors imposes requirements on social media companies to protect Coloradans under 18 from the sale of illicit substances and the unlawful sale of firearms.

"Our federal government has done little to protect children and teens from the drugs, illegal guns, and sexual exploitation rampant on social media platforms. Last year's report from the Colorado Attorney General's office detailed the ready availability of fentanyl and other illicit substances on social media platforms."

 Distracted Driving would extend the current law that prohibits a person who is under 18 years of age from using a mobile electronic device when driving anyone 18 years of age older, unless the person is using a handsfree accessory.

I am incredibly proud that this bill with Senator Fields passed unanimously in Senate Transportation and Energy Committee last week. SB24-065 builds on the work of legislation started by the honorable Lois Court, previous Senator for my district. This bill prohibits holding a

cellphone while driving to limit distraction and would require drivers to use hands-free devices. - Energy Infrastructure Siting and Decommisioning works to improve the siting and development of renewable energy facilities and transmission in Colorado and protects public health, safety, and welfare and the environment, including wildlife.
- Electricity Distribution System Planning focuses on strengthening electricity distribution networks to support the transition to renewable energy, electric vehicles, building electrification, and energy storage.

I am looking forward to the work that will be done over the next few months that will benefit the people of Colorado and those in our community. 
Every morning and evening you may have noticed many dogs out for a little fresh air. Meet a few of the neighborhood pups!

are the birds used for field training.






Dexter and Aureus are two beagle mixes who love adventures, walks, snuggles, and fallen food. Dexter recently passed away after a long happy life filled with love.

While most people do not consider the colder months opportunities for garden work, there is always something that can be done in the yard on the milder weather days. It is time to cut down ornamental grasses, spent perennials and unruly vines. If you are uncertain about methods consult CSU Extension. They have advice and online info on a wide variety of garden subjects. All is oriented to our specific Colorado requirements.

For those who love birds consider growing sunflowers in your garden this year. There are lots of kinds, many are quite beautiful, and some are very large. If you are growing for birds, the black oil sunflower is probably the most popular to the birds. The grey striped sunflower seeds are also good, but harder for birds to crack. Keep in mind that the squirrels love sunflower seeds, so be prepared to cover blooms with cheese cloth or similar protective cover that will deter the squirrels as the seeds develop. Birds are also attracted to insects and fruits.

My garden is widely diverse and includes flowers, grasses, shrubs, trees, fruits, herbs, and many vegetables when the season allows. I love to eat and nothing is better than fresh produce from one's own garden. I grow most vegetables from seed and start the ones that need time to develop

(tomatoes, pepper, basil) in late February/early March. Later in the spring I start squashes, cucumbers, and the like so they are ready to go in the ground when the time is right, usually mid-May. Other cold hardy seeds can be planted directly in the ground once the soil can be worked. These include lettuces, radishes, carrots, onions, Swiss chard, peas, and plants of broccoli, cabbage and kale. If you enjoy potatoes they can also be planted in March and harvested in July-August. Late potatoes (winter potatoes) are planted in April-May and harvested in September-November. I often plant early and harvest more than once in the season so I have those lovely new potatoes and larger ones later. It is a fun crop for kids, as digging them is kind of like finding buried treasure. Mixing flowers with vegetables is often very beneficial so do not forget to add some

If you like annual flowers, once again consult with CSU Extension. They conduct many trials to find the best producing flowers. Make sure your pots have well enriched soil in them to encourage lots of blooms and do not forget to water.



One of the appealing aspects of baseball is that you never know what will happen, or when it will happen. Such was the case on a recent snowy morning. I was out shoveling snow in January, which is probably the "least baseball thing" one can conjure. My across-thestreet neighbor was doing the same, when he came over to chat about... baseball!

Turns out, my neighbor

Morris Hoffman, a retired trial judge and Colorado native who grew up in Montclair recently wrote his first fictional novel, *Pinch Hitting*. It follows the antics of one Harold Fungo— a hitting phenom and former janitor, who was discovered by the grounds crew at a minor league park. Harold can hit anything and send it anywhere, a baseball manager's dream. He's also one of the nicest and most approachable guys you could hope to meet, armed with an "atomic smile" as Morris describes it.

Like any good novel, along the way we're introduced to colorful and memorable characters in Harold's world. The somewhat prickly manager, Wally Berens; "Big Bob" Cooper; veteran Clevon Sumford; Sam "Hercules" Fresne; and a King Soopers worker in Greeley, named Joe Skelton.

Joe provides a unique perspective into Harold's career, as he's dying of a brain tumor. Joe's world is also full of engaging characters. A singing Samoan, a piano prodigy, a pair of bullying twins, and even Joe's dog, all of whom add to the chronicle.

The stories of Harold and Joe aren't strictly tied to baseball, as they're accessible to all readers. There is a distinct local flavor to the book with several scenes set in and around Denver as well as the Front Range and the Great Plains region. Thus, it was an extremely comforting read to me as I'd be in the midst of a chapter and think, "hey, I've been there!"

Morris paints a vivid picture with his storytelling. As I began the book, I kept Google-ing some of the character's names, thinking they were real and asking myself, "why

have I never heard of this guy? He sounds interesting. Ahhh. It's fiction. Well played, Mr. Hoffman." The characters aren't caricatures and seem like they could exist in reality.

Most importantly, the stories of Howard and Joe kept me guessing and speculating until the very last page of the book. That's no exaggeration, as it was literally the *last page* when it all tied together. Like an actual pinch-hitter, I was digging in and guessing what the pitcher would throw at me with each pitch/page. I typically like to sit in my recliner at night and read a book with a good bourbon. Thus, when I finished *Pinch Hitting*, I was a little bummed that I would no longer be able to share my evenings with Harold and Joe.

Recently, Morris and I sat down and chatted about his book and baseball, in general. While the book may seem semi-autobiographical, Morris assured me that it's not. So don't worry, our neighbor is NOT dying of a brain tumor!

Overall, the book reminded me of why I love baseball. It's not watching the games and obssessing over numbers and stats. It's connecting with other baseball people and swapping stories. Morris swapped a great story with me, and it's making this season seem special already.
